In this past year alone, we completed an aggressive new *Five Year Strategic Plan* for the Alliance. The Board of Directors also recognized the need for CAEE to move beyond primarily governance and fundraising and into a fund development stage where we can start to build a financially strong and vibrant CAEE. To build much needed financial support for the environmental education profession, we started the year off with a Symposium on Environment and Education for funders and grant-makers.

Plans to grow that program in additional states will continue in 2006.

The 2005 Colorado Environmental Education Master Plan was published in June with an incredible vision for environmental education in Colorado. I hope you will take the time to read the goals and objectives, find your place in the plan, and let us know which aspects you are currently working on. The Master Plan is intended to be a living document, with on-going additions as environmental education grows in Colorado. Your comments on the plan are always welcome. CAEE serves as a “central nervous system” for the wide-ranging environmental education (EE) community by facilitating coordination and communication and providing other support services among hundreds of environmental education programs in Colorado. CAEE’s mission, to improve the collective product of statewide environmental education, is accomplished by managing several different capacity-building projects and professional development activities. Members and participants include public agencies, teachers, community organizations, businesses, and individuals distributing, supporting, or providing environmental education programs and materials. During the last 15 years, the organization has grown to include more than 600 members, 100 active volunteers, 2 paid staff, and several well established projects.

Fifth Annual Teaching OUTSIDE the Box Conference

CAEE hosted the fifth annual Teaching OUTSIDE the Box Conference, held April 29-May 1 at Snow Mountain Ranch, YMCA of the Rockies. The Teaching OUTSIDE the Box conference offers an opportunity for teachers, naturalists, interpreters, environmental educators, youth group leaders, and anyone who appreciates and enjoys nature and the outdoors to learn about fabulous environmental education activities, current research, innovative teaching techniques, new resources, and to network and share experiences and wisdom with others who strive to include nature in their teaching. The keynote speech was delivered by Denny Olsen, acclaimed author, performer, educator and master storyteller. Denny, as Professor Guano, awed, inspired, and challenged the EE community. More than 50 sessions were presented by environmental education leaders, with broad ranging topics including biodiversity, communications and marketing, journaling, tracking, grant writing, astronomy, geology, interpretation, collaboration and partnerships, sustainability, volunteer management, and insects. New Strategic Plan

Following the new 2005 Colorado Environmental Education Master Plan, CAEE embarked on a strategic planning process for the organization. A team of dedicated volunteers and the board of directors worked through the summer of 2005 to set the vision, goals, and activities for CAEE. The new five year strategic plan was completed in October 2005 and sets these broad category goals for the organization: organizational sustainability and development, communication, expand alliance, service to the community, environmental literacy and evaluation. Each goal is then further described with current problem statements and objectives. CAEE will use this plan to develop a yearly work plan to meet these goals.

Funding for CAEE Programs

In 2005 CAEE continued to build capacity for generating additional funding for CAEE programs and services. Significant, continued support for staff positions from the Colorado State Forest Service serve as a foundation for the organization. The continued sponsorships of projects from state agencies was also critical in funding CAEE for 2005. The Denver Foundation supported CAEE in 2005 with a general operating grant. Additional support for projects came through the US EPA, Region 8 and other grants, helping to keep our quality initiatives strong. This income was supplemented by private contributions such as those from Suncor Energy, USA who continued their long time support of CAEE in 2005. Additional funding was secured through a variety of individual and corporate donations. CAEE's auction fundraising event was the most successful event to date, raising more than \$13,000. CAEE matched funds secured through government allocations and grants with membership dues, fees for workshops, miscellaneous services, and in-kind contributions. Total cash income from all sources in 2005 was \$125,313.

Perhaps most impressive are the in-kind contributions from CAEE Board of Director members, member organizations, committee members, and volunteers. More than 100 volunteers helped CAEE's programs and activities succeed in 2005.

CAEE's Board of Directors and staff continue to work toward enhanced financial stability in 2006. The Board of Directors donated time for two day long retreats to create a fund development plan for CAEE that will help move away from periodic fund raising to sustained fund development. Areas of focus in 2006 will include: Partnerships, Sponsorship, Membership, Auction, Conference, Grants, Endowments, and Fees for service. The Board and staff believe that this fund development strategy, combined with the ongoing support of our partners, will continue to strengthen CAEE's financial stability in the years to come. On behalf of the Board of CAEE and its members, we wish to thank all those who supported CAEE in 2005 both with their invaluable time and energy and through monetary support in the form of contributions and grants.

Focus on Quality

In 2005, CAEE focused on awards for excellence, professional development, guidelines for environmental educators, and resource reviews to enhance a culture of quality in environmental education.

Awards for Excellence in Environmental Education

Initiated in 1996, CAEE Environmental Education Program Awards honor leadership in developing effective, cooperative, cross-sector environmental education programs. Three individuals and eight Colorado programs received awards in 2005.

Awards for lifetime achievement in environmental education were given to both Dave Sutherland of Boulder, and to Wendy MacPhail-Brigham of Aspen. The Enos Mills Lifetime Achievement Award is named after the Colorado naturalist credited with inspiring the establishment of Rocky Mountain National Park. Amory Lovins, co-founder and CEO of the Rocky Mountain Institute, was honored with the 2005 President's Award in recognition of innovative leadership in the field of natural resource conservation.

2005 Professional Development

CAEE hosted workshops in different parts of the state addressing the professional development needs of environmental educators. More than 28 opportunities were offered ranging from 2 hours to full-day sessions on topics as varied as volunteer management, evaluation, specific environmental issues, and guidelines for excellence in environmental education. More than 4000 people-hours of professional development was accomplished!

Guidelines for Environmental Educators in Colorado

A committee of the Colorado Environmental Education Advisory Council was tasked with creating state-specific guidelines that define competency for environmental education practitioners. *Colorado Guidelines* are organized into five themes that describe a knowledge or skill area that must be mastered to gain competency as an environmental educator. These guidelines represent the first step in Colorado to improve the effectiveness, validate the credibility, and strengthen the consistency of how environmental education programs are delivered. 120 educators were trained in the Guidelines in 2005.

EE Resource Reviews

The EE Resource Review System is a self and peer review process based on national guidelines for excellence to prove and improve the quality of environmental education resources. Years of effort in developing this system were validated in 2005 when, with very minor changes, the North American Association for Environmental Education (NAAEE) adopted Colorado's system as the model for the national system. There will now be one national system that supports state efforts to grow the program. CAEE volunteers and staff started a movement that will have a large impact on the collective product of environmental education. Lori Mann, Resource Review Chairperson for NAAEE, wrote to the committee, "I want to thank you.... I think we all gained a new appreciation for the depth and clarity of thought that CAEE's program is founded on. Your work is invaluable."

Colorado Environmental Education Master Plan



The 1995 Master Plan was revised and updated into this 2005 version. The goals and strategies in the 2005 Colorado Environmental Education Master Plan (CEEMP) are a crucial new re-visioning for the Colorado environmental education community. The re-vision is of a time when environmental education is fully embraced, supported, and integrated into everyday experiences for all people in Colorado. Broad support and visibility are needed to raise environmental education's value and fulfill this vision. This plan is designed to establish a framework for this collective effort, and foster long-term initiatives to be carried out by the whole environmental education community.

Goal Summary

The Master Plan identifies broad, statewide goals and indicates several important tasks in meeting each goal. The CEEMP sets forth the following interrelated goals to challenge and unite the EE community in realizing the vision of environmental literacy.

Goal I. Collaboration

Optimize efficiency and effectiveness through collaborative efforts and partnerships among environmental education providers.

Goal II. Professional Development

Provide and participate in opportunities to develop and enhance the knowledge, skills, and abilities of all environmental education providers. Commit to the conscious, pro-active pursuit of quality as environmental education providers.

Goal III. Promotion

Increase understanding of and support for environmental education by improving the skills and ability of environmental education providers to strategically communicate the value and effectiveness of environmental education.

Goal IV. Formal Education

Integrate environmental education into the formal education system (pre-K through post-secondary schools). Facilitate traditional education as a natural conduit for environmental education.

Goal V. Diversity

Increase and broaden the diversity of environmental education audiences, providers, and in environmental education programs.

Goal VI. Quality and Relevance

Improve the effectiveness, relevance, and integrity of environmental education opportunities, experiences, and products.

Goal VII. Systemic Environmental Education

Strive for a paradigm shift toward sophisticated, fully-systemic approach to environmental education.

All stakeholders in environmental education are invited to participate in the plan to strengthen our foundation and reach for our goals for environmental literacy. Through an integrated, systemic approach to EE, together we can realize the vision of the master plan. This plan is the beginning, not the end of a creative process, and this work will continue to be updated and revised as needed.

Other CAEE Activities in 2005

Networking Developing Community

CAEE provides many opportunities throughout the year for environmental educators to network. These networking opportunities focus on partnerships as an effective strategy to leverage resources and build capacity for environmental education in Colorado. In 2005, the successful Denver monthly networking series was expanded to Colorado Springs and Fort Collins.

EE Directory Creating Connections

CAEE has established itself as the hub for environmental education in Colorado. This database allows users to easily locate environmental education activities by topic, grade level, subject and more. The EE Directory helps connect those looking for resources with the best resources for their needs. With more than 900 listed on the website, there are programs of every sort for all ages and all interests.

Symposium on Education and the Environment Building Support
